Introduction of the new online housing application form

Federation members worked in partnership with Council Officers to develop and introduce a new online housing application form. We are really pleased to see this is now fully operational and allows people applying for their 1st tenancy as well as those looking to move to a bigger or smaller home or different area to easily update their forms online as things may change whilst waiting for an offer of housing. Of course, for those of us who don't have internet access or just don't really like doing things online, you can get support with this from Housing Service staff.

East Ayrshire Council Says...

The key aim of the project was to ensure that not only a more efficient allocations service was achieved, but that technology was embraced to deliver an unmatched online customer experience. Ensuring that applicants can create and update their housing application in an accessible, user-friendly way was central to the project, which would allow applicants to be guided through the process with all relevant information at hand, to assist them make informed decisions about their application choices. It was clear that digitising the system would bring benefits for staff too, with automated workflow enabling more efficient back-office processes.

Our system is fully interactive, and its intuitive nature empowers applicants to manage their application, allowing them to upload documents, receive progress updates and request appointments through a contact method of their preference. SEARCH online can be accessed through our website and by clicking on this link: SEARCH

Some of the other benefits for applicants that have been developed as part of our housing register include:

- Applicants no longer need to complete a multitude of applications, as the 4 previous paper applications have been merged to one which covers all information required to complete an application for housing ensuring all of our customers current housing circumstances have been taken into consideration.
- Information is provided to the applicant at all stage of the process with a navigation bar showing the applicant what has been completed and what they are still required to do.
- Applicants can view their position on housing register at a time that suits them and no longer need to wait for this to be posted to them.
- If an applicant advises that they have no-fixed-abode the system recognises this and automatically sends an email to our Homelessness Services for contact to be made to discuss their housing options.
- The system identifies where an applicant has selected housing preferences that are not held with stock within areas of choice and advises applicant to re-think their housing preferences.
- The system also provides information on the number of properties owned by each of the Common Housing Register partners within their areas of choices.
- Applicants can self-manage their application at a time that is suitable for them and are no longer constrained by office opening times.



Allocation Policy Review 2023

Federation members were joined by tenants from Atrium Homes, Cunninghame Housing Association, Riverside, Scotland, and Shire Housing Association as part of the review of SEARCH – the Single East Ayrshire Register for Community Housing. We met with officers who manage the Common Housing Register to give our views on the proposed changes to the Single Allocation Policy as well as content and layout of the questionnaire. The six proposed changes are:

- extenuating circumstances points awards will be reviewed every six months.
- strategic needs grouping for Armed Forces personnel awards will be extended from three to six months.
- priority two health and disability points will be increased from 20 to 21 points.
- applicants with a life limiting terminal diagnosis will be awarded the highest health and disability priority, where their current home is unsuitable for their current or future needs.
- applicants assessed as eligible for care and support points will be moved into the strategic needs group.
- · preserved waiting list points will be removed.

Wider consultation with tenants', applicants on the housing list, registered tenants' organisations, stakeholders, and several national charities was carried out during April / May 2023. The new policy was then approved by the Council Cabinet on 28th June this year.

What is SEARCH?



Launched in 2012, SEARCH is a partnership with <u>Atrium Homes</u>, <u>Cunninghame Housing Association</u>, <u>East Ayrshire Council</u>, <u>Riverside Scotland</u> and <u>Shire Housing Association</u> within a Common Housing Register (CHR) for East Ayrshire that uses a single <u>application form</u> to make it easier for applicants to apply for social rented housing within East Ayrshire and to extend greater choice for people seeking housing.

Celebrating Scottish Housing Day



We were delighted to host a "Meet and Greet" session for tenants, residents, staff, and Elected Members to celebrate Scottish National Housing Day in September this year. it was a great opportunity for folk to come together to find out more about the Federation and local tenants and residents' groups, Council Housing Service achievements and plans, and think about ways to get more people involved in tenant

participation, consultation, and scrutiny opportunities. Throughout the day, social media posts from Housing Service staff and the Federation shared our stories from the great work of our local groups and the Federation to personal stories from staff on their experiences working in such a valued service and profession.



Reviewing the Standard of Homes when Allocated to New Tenants

We have recently started a scrutiny project that will see us review the standard of Council homes when allocated to new tenants and how the process from a tenant leaving their home to a new tenant moving in works. We are really excited about this work as it will allow us to find out "if it does what it says on the tin". It will include reviewing the lettable standard and making comparisons with other landlords, meeting with staff, seeking new tenant views and visits to empty homes. Damp and Mould in Our Homes

You may have read with some distress as we did, about the tragic death of toddler Awaab Ishak, in Rochdale, England due to the presence of damp and mould in his family home. at a TIS information session for tenants across Scotland we found out, that although reported to the Borough Council, several times, no work was carried out to address the issue. Following Awaab's death, the Coroner's Report identified that his death 'the medical cause of Awaab's death was due to chronic exposure to fungus.' This triggered an investigation by England's Housing Ombudsman. The following report states that landlords should have a "Zero Tolerance Approach to Damp and Mould" and includes 26 Recommendations.

Housing Services new myHousing tenancy portal

Federation members worked with the Council's Housing Services to develop and pilot the recently introduced their new web portal, it's called myHousing. It lets you, as an East Ayrshire Council tenant, access your tenancy details and services online anytime in our user friendly online portal. myHousing has several helpful features and an interface that is easy to navigate. You can access it on both desktop and mobile devices. You can

- Access your rent account, pay. and print statements.
- Communicate using an online messaging system.
- View and update your personal information.
- Report anti-social behaviour.

- Apply to take in a lodger.
- Ask to run a business.
- Apply for pet permission.
- Ask to add, remove a joint tenant, or apply to transfer the tenancy.
- Terminate your tenancy.

You can find myHousing and other useful information about your tenancy services on our housing web page. To register just go to myHousing, is easy to use and it lets you access information and services when it suits you. Whether you're thinking about running business from home, you've found that perfect pet or you want to tell us who's in the household, there's so much more to it than just checking your rent account. Meet Some of Our Groups and Members >>

Campbell Area Tenants and Residents Association (CATRA)

We are a small voluntary group founded 15 years ago by tenants and residents because of serious antisocial behaviour issues in our area. In this time, we have successfully addressed antisocial behaviour and continue to work closely with EAC's antisocial behaviour team to keep our area safe.

We work closely with EAC's Housing Department, leaner Greener Communities and Neighbourhood Coaches having regular estate walkabouts with these departments to highlight issues that are needing attention within our area. Recently we expanded our remit to include Mill Crescent and Ladeside so we can now make improvements to the wider Townhead area of Newmilns.

Over the years we have improved our area by providing planters and hanging baskets, installed a memorial garden and maintained it on Isle Street Newmilns for Kathy Brown OBE.





We have influenced legislation through consultation with the Scottish Government and have representatives from our group on the Executive Committee of East Ayrshire Federation where we work to influence local and national housing policy and scrutinise housing services, achieving improvements for all tenants.

We recently sent the Easter Bunny round our area with eggs, which the children loved. Soon we will be starting our yearly planting of flowers in conjunction with Greener Cleaner Communities and Newmilns and Greenholm Community Council.

We are currently working on an exciting and challenging project to add state of the art Interactive play equipment to the existing playpark at Greenside Park and are in consultation with the wider community, and are being assisted by The Tenants Service, East Ayrshire Federation, Greener Cleaner Communities and Vibrant Communities.

We have more exciting projects on our agenda and a diverse and strong core committee who are dedicated to seeing these through.



Newton Tenants and Residents Association

Newton TARA, Kilmarnock have continued to work across our area to help improve our housing, our area, promote connectivity and enhance our already strong, supportive community. Our meetings continue to take place at 6pm on the third Thursday of every month, with the exception of December,

and are now held in the Baptist Church which is more local

to the area.

Throughout 2023, we have continued to hold guardianship of the defibrillator (stationed at the Baptist Church) which, we are pleased to say has remained unused; we have purchased our own litter picking equipment and have undertaken several clear ups as individuals, a group and in conjunction with elected members and Neighbourhood Coach David Murray. We also participate in any arranged estate walkabouts and use these opportunities to raise any issues residents might have and try to reach effective solutions with the relevant agencies.



Unfortunately 2023 found that some residents had numerous complaints about anti-social behaviour across the estate. Newton TARA took this forward by arranging a public meeting whereby citizens were able to raise their concerns with council representatives and local councillors who took these forward through the correct, official channels.

We held our second Race Night in nearby Glenfield Bowling Club which had a range of great raffle prizes and was a rip roaring success. The event rallied everyone across a wide range of ages and showed how strong and caring our small community is as we raised over £700



The cherry on the cake for many this year was by far our Seniors Christmas Lunch (funded by the race night). We hosted this in a more intimate venue this year, included over 30 residents and Loanhead Primary School choir opened the day for us with some Christmas

songs...pure joy! We then had a delicious three course meal, a game of pass the parcel, photo sessions and finished up with a round of Jingle Bells which by the power of sheer Christmas magic conjured up Santa Clause and his Naughty Elf who brought sacks full of gifts for everyone.

Although Newton TARA has a very small core group who do all of the organising, we do manage to do very big work and tackle social isolation and loneliness when we can. We are always on the lookout for new members and fresh ideas and welcome everyone residing in the area to join us at our meetings.

Energy Saving Tips

The cost-of-living crisis has made us all more aware of how much energy we use and more importantly, how much it costs to heat our homes. Here are some tips to save energy and more importantly money....

- Switch off Standy By you could save around £55 a year. Almost all electrical appliances can be turned off at the plug without upsetting their programming.
- Turn off lights you could save around £20 a year by switching off lights when you are not using them or leave a room.
- Replace bulbs with LED bulbs this could save you even more.
- Wash clothes at 30 degrees you could save around £27 a year and reducing your washings by one per week, could see you save even more.
- Avoiding use of a tumble drier could save you around £55 a year BUT remember to ventilate your home when drying clothes inside on racks.
- Spend less time in the shower you could save around £65 per year but cutting your time in the shower to just four minutes.
- Swap your bath for a shower some of us may enjoy a long soak in the bath but swapping one bath a week to a four-minute shower, could save you £14 a year.
- Be savvy in the kitchen when using your kettle, just boiling the amount of water you need, could save you £11 a year.
- Fill your dishwasher only run your dishwasher when it is full to reduce the amount of water you use. Reducing your dishwasher use by one run per week for a year could save you £13.





Befriending in East Ayrshire

Are you caring, reliable and flexible? Can you spare a few hours each week?

In return you will gain:

- comprehensive training
- ongoing support
- · out of pocket expenses
- the satisfaction of making a difference to a young life

Young people: We offer a befriending for children and young people age 5-18 years old. Befrienders are volunteers who support befriendees to take part in positive social and recreational activities. The outings include aspects of building trust, working towards intended outcomes and building confidence in the children and young people.

Older people: Here in East Ayrshire there's no excuse for our older people to be left alone or lonely and we all have a role to play in preventing this. There's lots that you can do to help:

- If you have an elderly relative, friend or neighbour maybe someone who recently lost a spouse or partner check in on them now and then and spend some time chatting, you'll enjoy it
- If you're worried about an older person, you know needing a bit of help because they are lonely why not refer them for a befriender!
- If you have an hour or two to spare every week or every month, why not become a befriender for an older person you can be any age our youngest befriender is 33 and our oldest is 73

New Build Homes....

Since April 2022, 104 new build council properties have been completed, as set out in the approved Strategic Housing Investment Plan 2023-28 and working with the Council's Developer CCG (Scotland) Ltd. Completions were achieved at the following developments:

- Mill Of Shield Road/Hannahston Avenue, Drongan (14 homes)
- Quarryknowe Court, Auchinleck (8 homes)
- Bellevue Gardens, Kilmarnock (18 homes)
- Witch Road, Kilmarnock (43 homes).
- A further 21 homes were completed at Holehouse Road, Kilmarnock, working with Barratt Developments.

Completions were also achieved by Registered Social Landlord (RSL) partners at:

- Irvine Road, Kilmaurs (21 homes)
- Campbeltown Drive, Kilmarnock (1 home)



Site starts for the delivery of new Council homes have been achieved at Kennedy Drive, Kilmarnock (48 homes) and Kilmarnock Road, Mauchline (17 assisted living properties). Works remain ongoing for the delivery of homes by an RSL partner at Bridgehousehill Road, Kilmarnock (101 homes).

Our Wildflower Project

Letting wildflowers bloom is creating a feast for hungry pollinators like flies and beetles to butterflies and bumblebees while helping biodiversity in the area.

WILDFLOWER MEADOWS - Wildflowers are our native flowers, that are unaltered by people. All the flowers found in your garden have been bred specifically for certain features, but they all actually originated from wildflowers.

THEY ARE GREAT FOR BIODIVERSITY - A single healthy meadow can be home to over 100 species of wildflowers, which in turn supports other meadow wildlife. For example, the common bird's-foot trefoil is a food plant for 160 species of insects, which in turn support mammals and birds such as shrews and lapwings.

THEY PROVIDE FOOD - Wildflowers provide bees, butterflies, and other pollinators with food throughout the year. On a single day in summer, one acre of wildflower meadow can contain 3 million flowers, producing 1 kg of nectar sugar. That's enough to support nearly 96,000 honeybees per day. Over a third of the world's food relies on insects to pollinate them. Without insects, we'd need to artificially pollinate most of our favourite fruit and veg, which would be time-consuming and very costly.

THEY CAN HELP WITH FLOODING - Established wildflower meadows have complex root systems, which makes the

soil very stable. This helps to mitigate flooding by holding on to rainwater and stops nutrients from washing away.

THEY CAN HELP US FIGHT DISEASE - Native wildflowers can contain compounds which have made a significant contribution to modern medicine. Flowers such as self-heal have antibiotic properties - there's a clue in its common name, as folklore has recognised its healing properties for centuries. And foxgloves contain a compound called digitalin that can be used to treat heart disease. These are just two of many examples and scientists are discovering more all the time.

THEY CAN HELP FIGHT CLIMATE CHANGE - Grassland soils can sequester as much carbon as woodland and reduces greenhouse gases, which can help us in the fight against climate change.

THEY'RE AT RISK - Since the 1930s, we've lost 97% of our wildflower meadows in the UK, which is a staggering amount, and we need to act now to make sure they don't completely disappear.

Within East Ayrshire, we identified 12 plots to plant and let wildflowers grow. Seeds have been sowed within the plots and we enjoyed seeing them bloom since June 2023.

East Ayrshire Council Tenant Satisfaction Survey 2023

East Ayrshire Council's Housing Service have engaged Research Resource to conduct a Tenant Satisfaction Survey, interviewing 1,200 East Ayrshire Council tenants, October to December 2023.

The purpose of the Tenant Satisfaction Survey is to understand tenants' views of the services provided by the Housing Service and priorities for potential future improvements and provide a comparison with a similar survey carried out in 2020.

Councillor Jim McMahon, (Council Spokesperson for Housing), said: "It is vitally important for me to have a clear understanding of how we as a council deliver services and meet the demands of our tenants in East Ayrshire. The provision of high-quality housing and services for tenants is of paramount importance to us. To achieve this, I would encourage all our tenants to participate in the survey".

The survey will commence across all communities from week commencing: 9th October 2023 for a period of 8-10 weeks.

The survey will take around 15 minutes to complete and all feedback will remain completely confidential. This survey is voluntary, and you do not have to answer any questions you do not want to. Interviews will be in person face to face. Research Resource interviewers will contact tenants selected, by issuing an introductory letter detailing the nature of the work that they are undertaking on behalf of the East Ayrshire Council's Housing Service. People being interviewed can call either East Ayrshire Council on 07786661223 or Research Resource on 0141 641 6410 to confirm that the interviewer and call is legitimate.

We will use the feedback to prepare a report for a meeting of the Council's Cabinet Committee in February 2024 at which Elected Members will decide the level of rent increase for Council tenants in the year 2024/25. We will then write to inform you what your new rent charge will be for 2024/25 at least four weeks in advance of any changes that may occur. Universal Credit Support Team, help when you need it

Looking for advice on Universal Credit? The visit our new Universal Credit webpage at East Ayrshire Council, it has lots useful information and help about Universal Credit. If you need a help applying, you aren't sure if what benefits you should apply for or are just struggling with getting online to apply then we can help. Just call our Universal Credit Support Team on 01563 503280 or email us at universalcredit@east-ayrshire.gov. uk. If you can go online you can complete our online referral form just telling us what we can do to help. We can help you with claim advice, claim assistance, maximise your income, assist with digital support, help set up email address or a bank account and help with budgeting. We can help over the phone or help you at home. We have maximised our clients income by £193k this year.

If you in receipt of tax credits, then you will soon receive a **Migration Notice asking you to move to Universal Credit from the DWP**. This is part of the DWP 'Move to UC' whereby legacy benefits such as:

- · Housing Benefit
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Child Tax Credits (CTC)
- Working Tax Credits (WTC)
- Income Support

Once you receive your Migration Notice you will need to make an application for Universal Credit. There are transitional protections (you won't be worse off) but if you don't apply for Universal Credit then your legacy will stop. Fire Safety

Every Hour of Every Day there is a house fire in Scotland – so, please make sure you are protected!

Fire safety top tips

- Plan your escape route and make sure everyone knows how to get out in a fire.
- Make sure you have smoke alarms on every level of your home.
- Test smoke and heat alarms weekly & never remove the batteries.
- Take extra care in the kitchen and NEVER leave cooking unattended.
- DON'T cook if you have been drinking alcohol or taking drugs.
- Try to avoid using a traditional chip pan with oil, use an electrical deep fat fryer instead.
- Keep appliances and cables away from your cooker.
- Switch off and unplug all electrical appliances.
- Do not overload electrical sockets.
- Never repair or re-join electrical cables with insulation tape.
- Make sure you use the correct wattage of bulbs in lamps and light fittings.
- Never cover lamps or light bulbs as they can quickly catch fire.
- Stub out all cigarettes and always empty ashtrays.
- Make sure candles and tea lights are in holders, away from curtains, and cushions.
- Close all doors this can keep your escape route free from smoke and may stop a fire spreading.

Housing Service's New Tenant Support Fund

Housing Service also recently approved a new Tenant Support Fund to support Council tenants. The fund aims to mitigate the challenges being experienced by tenants as a result of the cost-of-living crisis.

Using the fund will help Housing Services to prevent homelessness and sustain tenancies by directly alleviating rent arrears, providing fuel support and, in exceptional circumstances, direct financial assistance to tenants.

The fund will be used alongside other existing tools and financial supports such as <u>Discretionary Housing Payments</u> (<u>DHPs</u>), and it can cover a proportion, or all, of a tenant's rent arrears, however it should not be considered a replacement for financial supports already available.

It can be used where other solutions are not available with Housing Services best placed to identify priority cases, to make sure we target the fund at those who need it most who are at threat of homelessness.

Our Tenant Support Fund is open to all Council tenants, and it's aimed particularly people with rent arrears who are at risk, either now or in the near future, of losing their home where Notice of Intent, Court Action or Decree has been served.

We can also help tenants claiming Universal Credit if you're unable to repay the five-week arrears associated with your initial assessment period - subject to an income and expenditure assessment.

For those most at risk of fuel poverty, the fund will help if:

- · You're disconnected from your energy supply.
- You're using pre-payment meters and at risk of disconnection.
- You're living in areas not supplied by the gas network (off grid) and are at risk of disconnection.

This support will be administered by our partner: <u>Citrus Energy - Lemon-Aid</u>. **Please contact your local Neighbourhood Coach for more details.**

East Ayrshire Council's Local Housing Strategy: An opportunity to find out more and give your views...

East Ayrshire Council will prepare a new Local Housing Strategy in 2024/25, which will set out how the Council and partners will deliver housing and housing services over the next 5 year period.

To ensure the Local Housing Strategy is based on up-to-date information on the operation of housing sector in East Ayrshire, the Council is carrying out a Housing Need and Demand Assessment study. The study will help the Council to estimate the number of new homes needed across East Ayrshire over the next 5-10 years. It will also assess how to connect homes to jobs and local amenities; and inform plans to create great places and neighbourhoods. The results will help the Council plan for new housing and housing services, making sure the needs of all residents and communities are met.

As part of this study, a widespread survey of local households is scheduled to be held in late 2023/early 2024 to gather information on the housing circumstances and needs of local households so that a good range of housing options can be delivered in the future. The survey will gather information on the type, condition, and costs of accommodation, as well as the suitability of homes to meet housing need and the future aspirations of local households.

The survey will be carried out by an independent research organisation called Research Resource. The survey will include 400 telephone interviews and will be available online for all local residents to complete.

All East Ayrshire Council tenants are urged to participate in this important research survey. All survey responses will be for research purposes only and it will not be possible to identify individual tenants from the responses. Research Resource are registered under the Data Protection Act and all responses will be completely confidential.

Thinking of leaving your home?

Please help us by returning your tenancy in good condition to ensure that we achieve our Vision that "East Ayrshire will be a place with strong vibrant communities where everyone has a good quality of life and access to opportunities, choices and high-quality services which are sustainable and meet people's needs."

In accordance with East Ayrshire Council's tenancy agreement, tenants must give 28 days' notice of their intention to terminate their tenancy.

What should I do before leaving my tenancy?

Please ensure that you clear the property of all of your belongings including all floor coverings and furnishings making sure not to forget the loft and garden area.

Waste Management Services can provide advice on how to dispose of belongings that you are not taking with you to your new home.

You should also carry out any repairs or works that are your responsibility in accordance with your tenancy agreement and strive to leave the property in good decorative order.


If you have carried out any alterations or improvements without our permission, you must restore the house to its previous condition. This may include:

- Painting or wrapping the kitchen cabinets and worktops.
- Replacement of unsafe light fittings/sockets/switches
- Huts, Garages or other garden structures

Remember that failure to do so will result in you being charged for any costs incurred by the Council to carry out this work after you have vacated the property.

Make Your Own Sweet Treat - Christmas Gingerbread People

This recipe for gingerbread can be used to make a whole range of decorations, gifts and, of course, gingerbread people.

- Vegetarian
- Preparation time:20 minutes
- Cooking time: 10 minutes
- Total time:30 minutes
- Makes: 25 gingerbread people

Ingredients

125g unsalted butter

100g dark muscovado sugar

4 tbsp golden syrup

325g plain flour

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

2 tsp ground ginger

Icing (optional)

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170°C, gas mark 3. Line baking trays with baking parchment. Melt the butter, sugar, and syrup in a medium saucepan, stirring occasionally, then remove from the heat.
- 2. Sieve the flour, bicarbonate of soda and ginger into a bowl and stir the melted ingredients into the dry ingredients to make a stiff dough.
- 3. Turn out onto a lightly floured surface and roll to a thickness of about 5mm. Dip biscuit cutters into flour before cutting the dough, or cut around templates, which you can find in lots of shops. Place the shapes onto the lined baking trays and bake, in batches, for 9-10 minutes until light golden brown.
- 4. Remove from the oven. While still warm, and using a skewer or chopstick, make any holes that you will need to hang up the biscuits with ribbon or to make a yuletide garland. If you are decorating your Christmas cake with gingerbread people, make the holes in their arms so that ribbon can be threaded through at a later stage.
- 5. When completely cool, decorate with the icing. The gingerbread biscuits can be stored in an airtight container for up to two weeks.

East Ayrshire Federation Delighted to Meet Garden Competition Finalist and Winners!




