Scottish Housing Day



The Federation hosted an event on 18th September recognising Scottish Housing Day 2024, highlighting the theme for this year: 'Homes for Life.' A celebration of how Social Landlords can use innovative ways to allow people to be able to live longer in their homes. Our population is ageing faster in Scotland than in the rest of the UK, and as people grow older, their housing needs can change. This might require some simple adaptations to make homes more accessible, technology to support day-to-day activities, or planning to move to a more suitable home that's closer to family or local amenities, or easier to manage. The session explained how in East Ayrshire we are enabling people to remain in their homes for longer, through the 'East Ayrshire Care and Repair Service' and the "Housing Occupational Therapy Team."

The East Ayrshire Care and Repair service is a joint-funded initiative between East Ayrshire Council and the Scottish Government and is managed by Shire Housing Association. The aim of the Care and Repair service is to enable people to remain in their own homes for as long as it is practical and safe to do so. The service is available to owner-occupiers and private tenants who are over 60 years of age or have a disability at any age. The project is also designed to assist clients in hospital return to their own homes.

The Housing Occupational Therapy Team's main role is to assess applicants who are applying for housing due to their current property impacting their health and/or disability. The Team completes assessments that focus on applicants' functional difficulties within their current property, taking account of both physical and mental health. The team carries out assessments, awards a priority if applicable, and makes house type recommendations to ensure applicants are housed in properties that meet their long-term needs.



Tenant Participation, Engagement and Scrutiny Learning Module

A learning module has been created in collaboration with the East Ayrshire Federation of Tenants and Residents and East Ayrshire Council Housing and Communities Service. To help Housing and Communities colleagues better understand Tenant Participation, Engagement, and Scrutiny in East Ayrshire.

The learning module provides information on the Council's Tenant Participation Strategy, the Scottish Social Housing Charter, and an overview of Tenant Participation Engagement and Scrutiny activities.

It will also highlight how the Council takes forward its Tenant Participation, Engagement and Scrutiny activities. The module, it is hoped will become a learning tool, reference point and a source that allows Housing and Communities staff along with Tenant volunteers to understand your part of this process.



Rent Setting Consultation 2025-2026 a consultation on your rent charge for 2025-26

East Ayrshire Council consults annually with tenants, tenants and residents groups and the East Ayrshire Federation of Tenants and Residents (EAF) on our proposals relating to rent setting.



This year, the rent setting consultation period will run from 2 December 2024 to 24 January 2025 inclusive. ALL tenants who submit a response will be entered into a draw to win a £100 East Ayrshire Giftcard.

All East Ayrshire council tenants should receive a booklet through the post which details how to take part, or you can visit: engagementea.east-ayrshire.gov.uk/rent-setting. The Council use the feedback to prepare a report for a meeting of the Council in February 2025 at which Elected Members will decide the level of rent increase for Council tenants in the year 2025/26. They will then write to inform you what your new rent charge will be for 2025/26 at least four weeks in advance of any change that may occur.



Food Waste

Cleaner Communities want to make recycling your food waste as simple as possible.

Here's what we have done:

- waste liners can be collected from our libraries throughout East Ayrshire. Alternatively, when you need replacement liners you should tie a liner to the handle of your green bin when your supply is beginning to run low. Our crew will place a new roll in the caddy once it has been emptied.
- We provide you with an indoor caddy: You can request an indoor and outdoor food caddy from us to make recycling easy and mess-free.

Why recycle your food waste?

Waste accounts for around 42% of East Ayrshire's carbon footprint – this includes domestic and commercial waste collected and disposed by the Council.

To address this, we need our local businesses and residents to reduce the amount of waste they produce, whilst increasing the percentage of waste that doesn't go into the green bin and is instead recycled.

When food waste ends up in RDF (Refused Derived Fuel), it releases carbon dioxide which is one of the most damaging greenhouse gasses. This means that food waste is having a significant impact on the climate emergency.

When your food waste is put in your caddy:

- Your food waste is recycled, reducing methane emissions that contribute to climate change.
- Recycling food waste cuts disposal costs.
- Your recycled waste is broken down through anaerobic digestion to create biogas. Biogas is a natural energy source that can be used to generate heat, electricity or fuels.

Did you know?

- Even leftover pet food counts as food waste and can be put into you food waste caddy?
- If your food liners temporarily run out, simply line your containers with newspaper and then fill as normal. However, please do not use carrier bags or non-biodegradable plastic bags to collect food waste.

East Ayrshire Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Team

East Ayrshire Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Team is a dedicated service with a remit to deal specifically with Anti-Social Behaviour.

What is Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)?

The legislation states that a person engages in antisocial behaviour if they act in a manner that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress or pursue a course of conduct that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress to at least one person not of the same household as them. Due to its very nature ASB cannot be prevented and tackled by just one agency. It needs to be a joined up, partnership approach by residents, the council, Police Scotland, and other partner agencies as required. If you or anyone you know are encountering ASB then you can contact East Ayrshire Councils Anti-Social Behaviour Team on **01563 554400** or via email on <u>asbenquires@east-ayrshire.gov.uk</u>

You can also contact Police Scotland by calling 101 for a non-emergency or 999 if there is an emergency. Alternatively, you can access the Police Scotland website and email them direct through the "contact us" link within their site.

Universal Credit and You... Do you receive Legacy Benefits? In Scotland people who receive Legacy Benefits are now being transferred to Universal Credit (UC) by the Department of Work & Pensions.

What happens next?

Department of Work & Pensions (DWP) will contact you soon. You will receive a letter (Migration Notice) from the DWP inviting you to claim UC. You should make your UC claim before the end date on the letter. If you choose to make a claim for UC before receiving a Migration Notice, please seek advice as this may affect your entitlement and you may lose out financially. Call the UC Support Team at East Ayrshire Council on 01563 503280 or email our Universal Credit Team at universalcredit@east-ayrshire.gov.uk if you are not sure. If you are working and receive your pay on a different date each month, you should seek advice as to when to make your UC claim. Having a fluctuating pay date may impact your UC entitlement. Our team can help you with this and give advice on the best date to make a claim

Greener – Community litter picking stations

Community litter picking stations are being set up across East Ayrshire for community groups and members of the community to use.

Local community groups manage the litter picking equipment and storage units. Volunteers can request access to the equipment by emailing them.

Greener Communities will uplift the bags of litter collected through the community litter picking stations for recycling and disposal. Please arrange with Greener Communities prior to the litter picking event.

So far, stations have been set up on **Grassyards Road** and **Shawbank Place** in Kilmarnock with more to come throughout East Ayrshire in 2025.

You will be able to report a litter station that needs replenished online, as well as reporting how many bags of litter you have lifted during your pick.



The stations are fully stocked with: litter pickers, litter bags, gloves & high-visibility vests

We would like to thank Alexandra Maxwell, who is a Graduate Intern for some of the following articles, first lets hear about Alexandra's journey so far with East Ayrshire Council.

HI am Alexandra Maxwell, I am 22 years old and I am a Graduate Intern working within the Housing Strategy and Policy Team within East Ayrshire Council. I applied for the post at the beginning of year while I was still studying towards my degree in Social Sciences at the University of the West of Scotland. I was fortunate to be offered the job and started in April just two weeks after finishing my studies! My graduate internship has allowed me to kick-start my career and put what I have learned at University into working practice.

In the past six months, the staff at East Ayrshire Council have been really encouraging and have exposed me to many different opportunities to enhance my employability skills. In July this year I graduated with a First Class Degree in Social Sciences with a specialisation in Sociology and the main focus of my graduate internship has been working with my line manager to produce the new Local Housing Strategy 2025-2030.



This has involved consulting with community groups and colleagues which has helped me understand the needs of the East Ayrshire Community and how best we can help, which has utilised the skills of my degree in real life situations. I am excited for what the next six months of my graduate internship have to bring and for a long career in the housing sector and making a difference to people's life's which my graduate internship has been the stepping stone for!

New Build Homes

A development of 48 new homes, including a mixture of wheelchair dedicated homes, are being delivered by CCG on behalf of East Ayrshire Council on Kennedy Drive, Kilmarnock. Works are programmed for completion late-2024 and we are pleased to report the first two phases has been handed back.



Connecting Housing And Tenants (CHAT)

As part of the Council's commitment to ensuring all of our tenants are able to live in homes which are warm, safe and affordable, we have introduced a Connecting Housing And Tenants (CHAT) visit. The best way for us to do this is to meet with you in your home and have a conversation about your tenancy and it is important to us that you have the opportunity to ask any questions that you may have. The following will be discussed during your visit:

- The wellbeing of you and your household
- Benefit advice and maximising your income
- Your rent account
- Any repairs required, including dampness and mould
- Contents insurance
- · Looking after your home and garden
- Any other support needs you or your household may have

New Local Housing Strategy 2025-2030

The Local Housing Strategy sets out the Council's priorities for the delivery of housing and related services over a five-year period. Work has commenced to produce the next Local Housing Strategy. Tenant Safety

As we approach the festive period, we normally see increased battery use in, for example, Christmas lights and toys. There is also an increase in the volume of batteries and battery powered toys and equipment which is thrown away at this time of the year. Statistics issued by the British Safety Council showed that there were 201 fires on waste collection and recycling sites directly attributable to lithium-ion batteries. As toys and equipment which run on lithium-ion batteries both in our homes and in our workplaces, it is important to recognise the risks these batteries can pose and understand the basic measures everyone can take to minimise the risks of fire.

Firstly, it is important to point out that the risks from lithium-ion batteries is very low, when purchased from a reputable retailer and used in line with manufacturers guidelines and not exposed to damage, misuse or extremes of temperature. However, the following simple guidelines will help you and your family safe.

Safe use of lithium-ion batteries and equipment - Always purchase batteries and equipment which meets EN safety standards from a reputable retailer. Never leave batteries and battery powered equipment charging unattended and never leave charging overnight. Never charge batteries and powered equipment in your primary means of escape from your home, for example, your hall or landing. Never overcharge or misuse batteries or expose them to extremes of temperature.

Safe disposal of lithium-ion batteries – Put used batteries in a loosely tied bag and present them on top of your bin for collection. Take your used batteries to your nearest supermarket, which will have a safe disposal point. You can take used batteries and battery powered equipment, such as vapes, e-scooters, e-bikes etc. to your nearest civic amenity site (Western Road or Garlaff) for safe disposal. Never put used batteries in your bin for collection as they present a serious fire risk.

Dampness and Mould: Condensation forms when the air gets cold and the moisture in the air appears as droplets of water on cold surfaces such as windows and walls. You can avoid this by following these easy steps: Produce less moisture in your home; Stop moisture from spreading around your home; Ventilate to remove moisture; Keep your home warm; How to get rid of mould As soon as you start to see mould growth you need to clean it away. This is your responsibility. Fire Safety: The Scottish Government has advised that all homes in Scotland should have one: Smoke alarm in the room most frequently used for general daytime living purposes. Smoke alarm in every hallway or landing. Heat alarm in every kitchen. Alarms should be ceiling mounted and where possible should all be interlinked and to comply with the standard, we must install a smoke alarm in the hallway (top and bottom) and living area. A heat alarm in the kitchen. A carbon monoxide alarm in any areas where a combustion appliance is fitted i.e. boiler, gas fire, coal fire etc.
